

HOW TO ANSWER EXAM QUESTIONS

There are four parts to each question.

- (a) Worth 2 marks
- (b) Worth 4 marks
- (c) Worth 8 marks
- (d) Worth 6 marks



- (a) These questions are always **DEFINITIONS**. Make sure that you try and add an example of the definition if possible.
- (b) These questions are always **OPINION** based.
 - i. You need to give your opinion and **two** reasons for your opinion.
- (c) This is the most detailed question. It is always an **EXPLAIN** question. You are also marked for your ability to write well in this answer. You must write in full sentences and paragraphs!.
 - i. You have to write an **INTRODUCTION** (which is a repeat of the question).
 - ii. 5 key points including 5 points of evidence
 - iii. Finish with a **CONCLUDING** sentence (which is also a repeat of the question).
- (d) This is always an **OPINION** based question.
 - i. There are two sections that you write in.
 - i. This first section is where you write your opinion and you include 3 reasons for your opinion.
 - ii. In the second section you include why someone might disagree with your opinion and give 3 reasons for their opinion.

If you do all of this you will put yourself in a good position to get full marks


